What Does It Mean to Be A Community of Mystery?

December 2nd: "Mystery and Mysticism,"

In his book *Seven Types of Atheism*, author John Gray writes, "A godless world is as mysterious as one suffused with divinity, and the difference between the two may be less than you think." Today we'll explore mysticism as a form of spirituality, one that is rooted in the first of our six Unitarian Universalist sources that our living tradition draws from: direct experience of transcending mystery and wonder.

The offering at the Christmas Eve services goes to the Minister's Discretionary Fund, to be used to help those in need in our community.

From Your Interim Minister's Study

There's something about the dark nights of the coming winter that turns our minds to mystery, those timeless questions of life that are beyond our knowing—as the hymn we sing ponders—*Where do we come from? What are we? Where are we going? Mystery. Mystery. Life is a riddle and a mystery.*

Our living tradition of Unitarian Universalism draws from many sources. The first of our six sources is: "Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces that create and uphold life."

Mysticism is a strain that runs through Unitarian Universalism. UU minister and author Tom Owen-Towle describes us as *Freethinking Mystics With Hands*, in his book by the same title. Each of us has different experiences that in turn lead us to answer the big questions of life—the mysteries—differently.

What we know for sure is that what we do in this life, what we do with our life matters.

Historically, the church has been a place to ponder the mysteries of life and death, of origins and destinations, of beginnings and endings, of meaning and purpose, of ultimacy and intimacy, and how it is we are called to live this one wild and precious life. Ours is a non-creedal faith. In other words, we are not agreed upon the answers to these questions. No one need give assent to a statement of belief or creed to be accepted into membership with us. Our task is not so much to answer the questions, but to live with the reality of mystery, ambiguity, and doubt—to live the questions.

This season is one that draws us into mystery. We tell ancient stories of people who came before us asking the same questions that we ask today. The stories remind us of the miracle of birth, even our own, the miracle of light that shines even in times of darkness, the miracle of our very existence on this tiny planet, our blue boat home. It is a season that invites us to be filled with hope and joy and wonder and awe, reminding us that we are connected to each other in mystery and miracle.

May this holiday season, these holy days of wonder and awe, be filled with gifts of the spirit, gifts of life and love that come to us from sources beyond our knowing.

Covenant Groups

In November, groups considered what it means for UUs to be "a people of memory." Memory is fundamental to our understanding of ourselves as individuals. Parking Updates and Announcements

We have approval from the City of Coralville to park on Oakdale Road on Sundays and holidays. However, there are some restrictions. In the block between Abbie Ct and our driveway, we must honor the “No Parking Here to Corner” sign so that fire trucks can access the houses in that development. That means no parking from that sign to Abbie Ct. We also should not park within 5 feet of the fire hydrant. Finally, please leave the crosswalk clear for pedestrians to walk on the sidewalk to the front door of UUS.

A few other reminders:

- Park to maximize the number of spaces of street parking. Don't leave half a car's length between you and the next car.
- Follow the arrows in the UUS parking lot. Turn right at the first drive to loop around by the front door and out the second drive.
- Reserve the charging station parking spots for electric cars. It's okay for a non-electric car to park there if there are no other parking spots left in the lot.
- Overflow parking is available in the UI lot to the south on Oakdale Rd and the Kirkwood Regional Center to the north on Oakdale Blvd.

CUUPs Winter Solstice Celebration and Overnight Vigil, December 21st and 22nd

Join the Owl Moon Covenant of UU Pagans (CUUPs) for our annual Winter Solstice celebration and all-night Yule Vigil. This is the UUS Adult & Youth RE World Religions event for December.

The gathering will have three parts; it starts with an evening ritual and soup supper, then continues through the night in vigil and celebration, and concludes with a sunrise ritual to welcome the newborn Sun and breakfast. You are welcome to join us for all three parts or two or one as you desire. Join us at any time.

- Evening Ritual (Friday, December 21st): We’ll gather at 6 pm; the ritual will begin promptly at 6:30. In the ritual, we will bless the community that has formed, set intentions for the coming solar year, and prepare those who will sustain the vigil. We will provide the soups for dinner. Please bring bread, salad, or dessert to share. We ask that any food leftovers remain at the church to sustain those staying for the vigil overnight.
- Overnight Vigil: The vigil will follow dinner. Overnight activities include: songs, games, a mid-night candle walk, Sun crafts, spiritual activities, divination, food, drinks, spiritual shower, storytelling, reflecting, and opportunities to nap as desired. If you are staying overnight, please bring: suitable layers of clothing for the weather to wear during a candle-lit walk, sleeping gear if you expect you might need to nap, food and drinks to share, a towel, drums, and musical instruments.
- Sunrise Ritual (Saturday, December 22nd): We’ll gather at 7 am to make offerings, sing up the sun, drum in celebration, then have breakfast together.

All parts of this event are family-friendly; however, childcare is available for the Friday evening ritual from 6 to 8 pm. Parents/guardians will need to supervise their children at all other times.

Unitarian Universalist Society Board of Trustees MEETING HIGHLIGHTS – November 8, 2018

Board meeting minutes are made available on the website or can be requested from the UUS administrator.

Present: Jane DeWitt (President), Jim Laughlin (Past-President), Amy Fretz (Vice-President), Chris Rode (Treasurer), Peg Voelker (Secretary), Michael Honey-Arcement (Trustee), Paul Pomrehn (Trustee), and Rev. Diane Dowgiert (Ex officio Interim Minister). **Absent:** Sara Feldmann (Trustee) and Colleen Higgins (Trustee). **Guests:** None.

Board President DeWitt called the meeting to order at 6:32 p.m. Fretz provided opening words.

Consent Agenda & Announcements: Consent and other items are uploaded to Dropbox for review prior to the meeting.

Consent Agenda items: Board Agenda; November Executive Committee Minutes; October Board Meeting Highlights & Minutes; Minister's Monthly Report; Treasurer's Report and Financial Statements; 2019 Draft Budget; Staff Relations Committee report; Email Vote – Approval Uptown Bill's Fundraising Request; and Email Vote – Approval NAACP Fundraising Request. *Other items:* Congregational Meeting Agenda Draft (Voelker); Proposed Changes to By-laws Draft (Voelker); Proposed Library Donation Policy (Jessica Zimmer-Saltzman); and Board Position Job Descriptions.

Voelker noted that when necessary, the Board votes via email on matters occurring between meetings. A summary of such voting and related communications will now be included in the Consent Agenda. During the past month, the Board voted by email to approve UUS-sponsored fundraising events for Uptown Bill's and NAACP. DeWitt shared that she was contacted by Jim Olson, representing Leadership Development (LDC). He would like people in leadership positions to give testimonials to boost the interest of members to serve. Honey-Arcement offered to do so on December 2nd and DeWitt can on January 6th. Olson also requested a job description for the Finance Trustee, invited Board members to share with LDC the names of potential nominees for elected positions, and opened a discussion about LDC involvement with Board Orientation. Also shared was that UUS received a Community Partnership Award from the Arc of Southeast Iowa for hosting their summer camp and Art Show in 2018. Michael and Rochelle Honey-Arcement attended ARC's annual meeting to accept the award. *The Board received the Consent Agenda and approved the November Executive Committee meeting minutes and October Board highlights and minutes.*

Library Donation Policy Proposal: Jessica Zimmer-Saltzman (DLRE) submitted a draft library donation policy to the Board. Rev. Dowgiert explained that Zimmer-Saltzman is seeking guidance on how to respond to requests to donate materials. Discussion included whether there are multiple "libraries" (e.g., youth, adult, historic); material locations (e.g., Reception Area, RE Commons, Conference Room); and who and/or what groups (e.g., DLRE, Adult RE Committee, Historic Records Committee) should have oversight of the materials. Rev. Dowgiert will take this issue back to the staff to resolve – obtaining input from members and potentially forming a task force as warranted.

2019 Budget Discussion: Rode provided three potential 2019 budgets – a Need, a Want, and an In-Between. The In-Between budget will be presented for a congregational vote. Rode enumerated the major elements he will present at the meeting – which include the 2019 budget, the facility mortgage, fixed building expenses, and the solar-power purchase agreement. Also discussed was the upcoming switch by UUA from congregational fees calculated from the number of members to the Annual Program Fund (APF) calculation which is based on certified expenditures. UUA will cap our contribution at a 10% increase over last year. Rode reported that the 2019 pledge drive results thus far are promising – with return pledge units increasing their 2019 pledge by 18%. However, after the remaining pledges are received, we may still face a manageable budget shortfall.

December Congregational Meeting: The congregational meeting will focus on the proposed 2019 Budget but will also include a vote on changes to our by-laws related to the Committee on Congregational Life and Ministry (CCLAM), an overview of the upcoming ministerial search process, and a report from the Interim Transition Team. The agenda and proposed by-law changes were finalized.

Safety and Security Policy Plan: The scope of the Building Security Task Force's work is limited. A different group needs to be formed to work on overall security and safety and to update our Policies and Procedures (P&P) manual. Several people were suggested to recruit for this effort. DeWitt will contact them and schedule an initial meeting.

Closing: Rev. Dowgiert provided closing words. Rode reported as Process Observer. The meeting adjourned at 8:55 p.m. The next Board meeting is Thursday, December 13, 2018, starting at 6:30 p.m. in the UUS Conference Room.

CURRENT

ARTICLE X – COMMITTEES

A. The following leadership positions shall be filled by election by the congregation at the annual meeting: Trustee, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Endowment Committee member, Committee on Congregational Life and Ministry member (**except during periods of interim ministry**), and Leadership Development committee member.

According to UUS's bylaws, members are eligible to vote at the Congregational Budget Meeting on December 9th, 2018, if they 1) have signed the membership book, 2) are over 14 years of age, 3) have made an annual financial contribution of record to the annual operating budget or are Life Members of the Society, and 4) have been members at least 30 days prior to the meeting. Our Policy on Membership Voting Eligibility and Contributions of Record also requires applicable donations to the operating budget be made between January 1st, 2017 and November 9th, 2018.
