## From Your Interim Minister's Study

*Possibility* is the theme for January, aptly so. The beginning of a New Year is a fitting time to dream and imagine new horizons. The month of January is named for the Roman god, Janus—the god of beginnings and endings, of gates and transitions, doorways and passages. Janus is usually depicted as having two faces, one looking to the past and one looking to the future.

Interim ministry is all about possibility. Figuratively speaking, Janus is its god—looking back to understand the past and looking forward to new opportunities and potentialities.

Here at UUS, January's theme of *Possibility* will be explored in worship services, Covenant Groups, and religious education for children and youth. More than that, it will be embodied by the Interim Transition Team and your Board of Trustees.

The Interim Transition Team is beginning a total-systems review. In other words, they will be looking at all the different aspects that go into the functioning of your congregation. They will be looking at things like how you welcome newcomers, how you manage your finances, how you care for your physical plant, how you nurture your congregation's spiritual, emotional, and relational health, how you connect to the larger UU world—and then some. It's like an annual physical, checking vital signs, assessing overall health, and gaining a deeper appreciation of what is going well and where you might want to make some changes. Knowing your congregation well is important in making a good match with a new minister.

Meanwhile, your Board of Trustees is considering how to best govern the Society, given its current size and the complexity

of the building. Your current membership of 301 is an indicator that the congregation is too large for a volunteer board to manage on a day-to-day basis. Add a technologically sophisticated building that is in almost constant use by groups within the Society and rented to outside groups—and the challenge is even greater.

Those attuned to governance matters have likely heard the terms “policy-based” or “policy-style” governance, a direction in which UUS has been moving for a few years now (or so I am told). It is a system that shifts the focus of the Board to fiduciary responsibilities (e.g., legal and fiscal issues), mission/vision, policy formation, oversight, and assessment. Authority for day-to-day management, operations, and programming is delegated to the minister and staff.

In other words, there is a clear delineation between governance and ministry. The work of the Board is to govern. The work of the minister and staff, professional and volunteer, is to engage the congregation in doing ministry.

From where I sit as your Interim Minister, I see this work as essential. This shift in governance will lay the foundation for a long and fruitful ministry with the person you call as your next settled minister.

This style of governance offers many gifts: clarity of roles and responsibilities, streamlined decision-making, and clearer lines of communication. It frees up more energy for furthering the Society's mission of touching hearts, changing lives, and transforming the world with your love.

A time of interim ministry is a time of possibility, a time to experiment and explore. I have come to know you as an adventurous people willing to take on big challenges. A shift in governance is no small thing. You will undoubtedly have questions. Please know that you can bring those questions to me and/or members of your Board of Trustees.

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## From Your Board President

For most of us, the New Year means beginnings, possibilities, and a time when we may resolve to make a change in our lives. As a congregation, we may think we've dealt with enough change in the past few years: moving into our new building and coping with a ministerial transition. These changes have opened an opportunity for us as a society to review our goals and to consider how we are organized and how we get things done. In a sense, this time of interim ministry provides an opportunity for reflection, discernment, and resolution, much like the New Year.

Caring for our new building and the surrounding land is very different than maintaining our property at 10 South Gilbert. Welcoming first-time visitors and returning guests who express interest in our Society, and serving a growing membership are administrative and ministerial challenges we need to embrace. Through shared ministry to members, friends, and the broader community, we continue to live out our mission and vision on a regular basis. All of this work is accomplished by our minister, staff, lay leaders, committees, and members in ways that may not be very visible to most of us.

The UUS Board and our Interim Minister have agreed that now is the time to consider the existing structure and processes for how we do this work: who has authority? who has responsibility? who communicates with others, and how? We have a capable and experienced Interim Minister who is ready and willing to help us in this process, and we should take advantage of the possibilities that await. Guided by her experience, the book *Governance and Ministry* by Dan Hotchkiss, and other resources, Rev. Diane has presented us with recommendations for realigning how some of our committees and working groups engage with the staff and each other.

We believe these changes are worthy of our support. In addition, we believe this will strengthen us in both governance and ministry—and position us well for a successful search and future with our next settled minister. We expect to seek input and assistance from lay leaders, as well as all members, as we move forward in this effort. We hope you see the possibilities that are ahead for us in 2019!

## Racial Justice Ware Lecture Showing, January 20th

On Sunday, January 20th, at 11 am in the Hickory and Oak Rooms, the Racial Justice Study/Action Circle will kick off the celebration of Martin Luther King Jr. Day activities by showing the Ware lecture from the 2018 UUA General Assembly. The Lecture features Brittany Packnett, a leader at the intersection of culture and justice who serves as Teach For America's Vice President of National Community Alliances, where she leads partnerships and civil rights work with communities of color. Cited by President Barack Obama as a leader whose "voice is going to be making a difference for years to come," Brittany is an unapologetic educator, organizer, writer, and speaker. A former teacher, policy expert, and nonprofit executive director, Brittany has committed her life and career to justice.

At 7 pm on Tuesday, January 29th, the UUS Secular Humanists will host Dr. Rev. Paul Knupp at Old Brick in Iowa City. Dr. Rev. Knupp has worn many hats over his busy, full career: settled/interim minister, college instructor, politician, UIHC chaplain, and lobbyist for Common Cause, to name a few. He also founded the Humanist Society of Iowa and is an American Humanist Association (AHA) Chaplain for the Iowa Dept. of Corrections.

Dr. Knupp helped UUS member Simon Tunstall establish an AHA chapter at the Fort Madison Penitentiary while Simon was an inmate there. Now at IMCC in Coralville, Simon hopes to start a Humanist Chapter there as well, with the help and support of Dr. Knupp and UUS. Dr. Knupp will speak on his experiences with this and his prison ministering. All interested in this type of UUS prison outreach are encouraged to attend.

UUS members Joe Brisben and Mark Yuskis visit Simon nearly every week, and he follows UUS and the Secular Humanist activities closely, eagerly awaiting each monthly newsletter. Hi, Simon!

## Unitarian Universalist Society Board of Trustees MEETING HIGHLIGHTS – December 13, 2018

Board meeting minutes are made available on the website or can be requested from the UUS administrator.

**Present:** Jane DeWitt (President), Jim Laughlin (Past-President), Amy Fretz (Vice-President), Chris Rode (Treasurer), Peg Voelker (Secretary), Sara Feldmann (Trustee), Michael Honey-Arcement (Trustee), Colleen Higgins (Trustee), and Rev. Diane Dowgiert (Ex officio Interim Minister). **Absent:** Paul Pomrehn (Trustee). **Guests:** None.

Board President DeWitt called the meeting to order at 6:28 p.m. Laughlin provided opening words.

**Consent Agenda & Announcements:** Consent and other items are uploaded to Dropbox for review prior to the meeting.

*Consent Agenda items: Board Agenda; December Executive Committee Minutes; November Board Meeting Highlights & Minutes; Minister's Monthly Report; Treasurer's Report and Financial Statements; Email Vote – Approval Parking Rental Agreement; Email Vote – Approval Endowment Advisor; and Email Vote – Approval Lopez Weaving Sale.*  
*Other items: Board's Interim Ministry Timeline (Dowgiert).*

*The Board received the Consent Agenda and approved the November Board highlights and minutes.*

**Governance and Ministry Organization, Planning, Timeline:** The majority of this month's Board meeting was spent on this agenda item. Rev. Dowgiert conveyed that it is important that UUS have a clear and functional structure of governance and organization in place before the arrival of our next settled minister. She recommended that, given our current size, UUS shift to a policy-style governance system. Such a system allows the Board to focus on "governing" and delegates day-to-day authority to the minister and staff. Please see columns in the January Newsletter by Rev. Dowgiert and Board President DeWitt for more on this topic.

**Other:** Several other business items were reviewed, including the parking lot rental agreement, parking & neighborhood issues, and the comparison of in-house versus external accounting.

**Closing:** DeWitt provided closing words. Honey-Arcement reported as Process Observer. The meeting adjourned at 9:17 p.m. The next Board meeting is Thursday, January 10, 2019, starting at 6:30 p.m. in the UUS Conference Room.

### Congregational Meeting Highlights - December 9, 2018

Following opening words by Rev. Diane Dowgiert and the chalice lighting, President Jane DeWitt called the meeting to order at 11:05 a.m. A quorum was established with 104 of the 301 voting members in attendance.

**Interim Transition Team Report:** Tom McMurray reported on the work of the Interim Transition Team (ITT). McMurray and Diane Martin serve as co-chairs, and the other team members are Jeanette Carter, Virginia Melroy, Gary Lawrenson, Peter Brokaw, and John Lanaghan. McMurray summarized that their purpose is to assist the Interim Minister by providing insight, organizational and facilitative talent, and willing hands as the ministry proceeds. They continue to meet with Rev. Dowgiert monthly and will also be talking with staff and congregants.

**2019 Pledge Drive Report:** Jeffery Ford, co-chair of the Stewardship Committee, reported that to date, 180 pledges had been turned in totaling \$415,000. On average, members increased their pledges from 2018 by 16%. The committee is confident that once the remaining pledge units are received, the 2019 proposed budget goal will be reached. Ford expressed gratitude for the congregation's generosity.

**2019 Budget Presentation & Vote:** Chris Rode, Treasurer, provided a budget summary document and presented an overview of the UUS 2019 budget (proposed \$609,392). Rode highlighted several aspects of the budget including: a commitment to meeting UUA fair share dues and compensation; mortgage status and timeline; building expenses; "fixed" versus "variable" expenses; and the agreement with UU Solar LLC for electricity. *The congregation unanimously approved the budget as presented.*

**Proposed Changes to By-Laws & Vote:** DeWitt explained that the proposed revision to the by-laws regarding the Committee on Congregational Life and Ministry (CCLAM) is related to UUA recommended interim ministry practices. The revision adds the phrase "except during periods of interim ministry" to Article V, Section A, and Article X, Section A. *The congregation approved the changes as proposed.*

**Overview of Ministerial Search:** Rev. Diane Dowgiert shared that she has developed a deep appreciation and affection for UUS. She described the five common goals addressed by congregations during interim ministry and then briefly outlined a timeline of activities culminating in UUS calling its next settled minister in April/May 2020.

After announcements, closing words, and extinguishing of the chalice, the meeting adjourned at 12:05 p.m.
