October 2019's Spiritual Theme is Belonging

October 6th: "Beyond Categorical Thinking: What a T-Rex Named Penelope, Pittsburgh, and a Theologian Can Teach Us About The Future of Religion and Our Commitment to Equity and Justice," Keith Kron

Religion, including Unitarian Universalism, is at a moment in time. Can it survive? And what must it do in order to survive? What must we do? We'll explore our place in today's world, and why it's metaphorical meteorites and not a comet that could wipe us out. UUA Transitions Coordinator Keith Kron will lead this service, followed by a congregational workshop. (See page 3 for details.)

October 13th: "What It Means to Belong," Rev. Diane Dowgiert

We all long for a place where we are welcome, a place where we fit, a place where we belong. Finding that place is not an end but a beginning, for once we are inside the circle, we must participate in expanding it. Belonging is a verb—it takes active participation to nourish, expand, and sustain a community. What are the ways each one of us is called to nourish the beloved community that is UUS?

October 20th: "Reaching Beyond Borders," Rev. Diane Dowgiert

In considering this month's theme of *Belonging*, we will hear stories of UUS members who recently traveled to the border between Texas and Mexico to give aid to those who have been uprooted from their homelands due to violence and climate catastrophe. To live in exile is the opposite of belonging. How are we called to respond to the exiles at our border?

October 27th: "Day of Remembrance," Rev. Diane Dowgiert

We will gather as an entire multigenerational community to remember loved ones who have gone before. You are invited to bring a photo or memento of someone you wish to remember on this day. Together we will create an altar of memory.

October's Social Justice Offerings Benefit Shelter House

The emergency shelter provides 70 beds, breakfast and dinner meals daily, clothing, laundry services, shower facilities, drop-in services, case management, a job lab and more. In 2019 Shelter House opened Cross Park Place, with 24 affordable apartments for individuals struggling with chronic physical and/or mental health issues. Onsite behavioral and primary healthcare services and cross system collaboration are included.

From the Interim Minister's Study

October's theme is *Belonging*. These days I am immensely grateful for the place to belong that is Unitarian Universalism. When I travel and visit other UU congregations, I am always struck by how much at home I feel. The simple ritual of lighting a chalice lets me know that I am with my people. This sense of connection is vital to my well-being, knowing that I am not alone in this world.

We live at a time of disconnection, a time of political division and polarization, a time when we can feel alienated from our neighbors. Loneliness is not good for us humans, especially when our world seems to be spinning out of control. If you are like me, there are days when it's hard to feel balanced, hard to keep the fear and anxiety monsters at bay. Which is why I am so grateful for this Unitarian Universalist faith we share. Here we are part of a living tradition that has held a higher vision for whom we might become, a living tradition of people who have faced challenges, whose words and deeds remain as sources of hope in our time. Here we find companions for the journey, knowing that we don't have to go it alone.

There are some things we can all do to maintain balance during these challenging times. When so much seems out of our control, focusing on what we *can* do, helps:

- A daily spiritual practice. For me that means beginning each day in quiet. Sometimes I sit in meditation, sometimes I practice yoga or tai chi or qi gong. Sometimes I read something inspirational. Sometimes I journal. My practice is to make every morning sacred, that is, time set aside to nurture my spirit.
- Spend time outdoors. I love walking the many beautiful trails here in Iowa, feeling my connection to the natural world.
- Nourish your body. Eat healthy meals. Get regular exercise and adequate sleep. Hydrate. Breathe.
- Connect with family and friends. Many of my friends and family members live at a distance. We intentionally schedule times to get together via Zoom or by telephone.

- Play. Enjoy life. Whether it's playing board games, going out to a movie or a concert, or enjoying simple meals together, keeping social connections is vitally important during challenging times.
- News and social media breaks. When the news cycle is relentless with crises, tragedies, and political scandals, it's okay to tune it all out from time to time.
- Take action. Go to a march or protest. Volunteer to serve others. Support a political candidate, locally or nationally. Work to get out the vote. I try to take a no-driving day at least once a week. We may not be able to fix everything that's wrong right now, but these words of the Unitarian Edward Everett Hale come to mind:

I am only one. But still I am one.

I cannot do everything, but still I can do something.

And because I cannot do everything

I will not refuse to do the something that I can do.

- Have real conversations. Talk about the hard stuff. Even the scary stuff. Here are links to some resources for talking with children about climate change:

Annual Notice of Safe Congregation Policy

All members of the Unitarian Universalist Society have a responsibility to provide a safe and caring community in which our children and youth are respected, in which their self-worth is affirmed, and in which spiritual, social, and intellectual growth are encouraged.

We achieve these goals in part through the implementation of the Safe Congregation Policies and Procedures (SCPP). A complete copy of the SCPP is available on page 55 of the current Policies and Procedures Manual, available on the [UUS website](#) and in the office. Some important highlights are:

- Staff and volunteers working with children or youth will be screened and trained, and volunteers will have attended the Unitarian Universalist Society regularly for at least six months.
- Two appropriately screened supervisors will be present at all times in the nursery, religious education classrooms, and during any church-sponsored activity involving children or youth.
- The church building will not be open to children or youth for any activity until 2 supervisors are present.
- No child younger than third grade will be dismissed from religious education class without an appropriate parent, guardian, or other appropriate supervisor.
- Other children will be dismissed without supervision to join their parent/guardian or other appropriate supervisor.
- All children in the nursery will need to be signed in and out.
- Church functions providing childcare require two DRE-trained supervisors, an open door, and the presence of adults in the building.

Ministerial Search Committee (MSC) Report

Your Ministerial Search Committee has been busy tilling the soil, and now we invite you to join us in planting the seeds in this process of finding our new settled minister. If all goes as well as we hope, we will all celebrate the harvest next spring.

Here are a few examples of the upcoming opportunities where you will be able to collaborate with us.

- **Beyond Categorical Thinking Workshop:** Sunday, October 6th, at UUS with Keith Kron of UUA. The deadline for registering was September 29th (online at bit.ly/UUS_BCT or in the Fellowship Hall after Sunday service).
- **Cottage Meetings:** October 10th, 13th, 15th, 20th, 27th and November 3rd at UUS or at the Iowa City Public Library. You will be notified soon about how to sign up for these meetings.
- **Focus Groups:** Various times and dates during October.

We also will be reporting on the analysis of the Congregational Survey results sometime in November.

Stewardship Team: 2020 Pledge Campaign Begins in October!

The 2020 Stewardship Campaign slogan is “Tending Our Roots.” UUS is like a newly transplanted tree: our roots are getting deeper and stronger, but they need tending so they can support new growth. We have settled into our new space and are in the midst of a search for a new minister. Great things are in our future, but we need your participation to ensure we have the deep, strong roots necessary to sustain our congregation and its work for generations to come.

The Board and Finance Committee have asked the Stewardship Team to raise \$460,000 in pledges for our operating budget in 2020. This represents a 5% increase from 2019 and is necessary to cover our existing expenses. By meeting this pledge goal, we will be able to sustain the progress we have made and avoid having to cut programs or staff positions.

The 2020 Stewardship Campaign officially kicks off this month on Sunday, October 13th. Stewardship materials, including a pledge form and instructions for pledging and giving through Realm, have been mailed to all members and friends. By pledging in advance, you allow the Board to anticipate income and draft a workable budget for the coming year. We ask that you carefully consider your ability to contribute financially and make a commitment that is meaningful to you.

Our Ceremony of Commitment celebrating our combined pledges will take place on Sunday, November 17th. We ask that you submit your pledge in advance so it can be included in that shared total. You can return your pledge form to UUS using the return envelope provided in the stewardship packet, mail the form to the Administrator’s office or bring it on a Sunday, submit your pledge in Realm, or contact the office (337-3443 or admin@uusic.org). Contact the office with any questions or if you did not receive a stewardship packet in the mail.

Covenant Group Council Report

Covenant groups did not formally meet in August, as members travelled or otherwise enjoyed their summers. This month, however, we are reconvening and renewing our commitments to our groups and to each other. In the words of the UU Commission on Appraisal: “One of the deepest convictions that unites us as Unitarian Universalists is the belief in the possibility of a beloved community among people We affirm such communities are in part a natural outgrowth of human life, but they also must be deliberately formed and reformed, nurtured and renewed.” In our groups, we will use our time to remake some of the small communities which comprise UUS.

The covenant group program offers its members the opportunity to express their views and deepen their understanding of a wide range of issues while creating closer ties with other UUs. Hearing Assistive Technology Workshop, October 13th

UUS has several hearing assistance devices (loops) that can be used on their own with the provided earphones or with your own headphones or earbuds during UUS services and other events that use our sound equipment. They can also connect to some personal hearing aids/hearing devices. After the service on Sunday, October 13th (at 11:30 am) Doctor of Audiology and A/V volunteer Christine Etler will host a training workshop in the Sanctuary to familiarize UUS members and friends with these devices.

If you have your own hearing devices, bring them in to learn about optimizing their use during UUS programming. Christine will help with your headphones, hearing aids, personal microphones, or other wireless hearing aid accessories. As a way to welcome and support transgender and non-binary gender individuals, UUS now offers the option of putting a small sticker on your name badge indicating your personal pronouns: She/her, He/his, They/them, Xe/xem, Ze/zir, or your own choice. This class, which will be held at 6:30 pm on Thursday, October 17th, at UUS, will help us to learn more about the importance of personal pronouns as well as general issues facing transgender and nonbinary gender individuals overall.

Family Nights take place at UUS and are co-hosted by the RE program and a different family each month. We'll provide the main dish, and families are invited to bring a side or dessert to share. Message from MidAmerica Region

Seeking Board Nominations

The Nominating Committee of the UUA MidAmerica Region is seeking candidates for the Regional Board and the Nominating Committee itself. We seek to nominate individuals to reflect the full diversity of the Region, especially with regard to historically marginalized communities, but also balancing across size of congregation, lay and ordained, geography, age (including youth and young adults), and gender, among other characteristics. Members in good standing of one of the member congregations of the Region or Church of the Larger Fellowship members residing within the MA Region are eligible to serve.

- The Board of Trustees is responsible for governance between annual meetings of the member congregations. There are nine members serving three-year terms. The members are elected directly by delegates at the annual meeting, and they elect the President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer from among themselves.
- The Nominating Committee has seven members serving two-year terms. This committee recruits and nominates volunteers to serve on MA Region's Board of Trustees, Nominating Committee, Midwestern UU Conference Board, and Camp UniStar Board.

The purpose of the Midwest Unitarian Universalist Conference is to further the interests of Unitarian Universalists and their institutions in the mid-continental states and provinces, to promote, foster and encourage the interests of the UUA, to support those institutions to spread the message of Unitarian Universalism, and to distribute the surplus income generated by funds in trust by Midwest Unitarian Universalist Foundation, a subsidiary corporation.
