Sunday Services

A social hour follows the 10 am service.

December 1st: "Awakening to Awe," Susan Salterberg

What gives you a sense of awe? This Sunday we will hear poetry that reflects and celebrates moments of awe. This seems especially important during the midst of the holiday season, when it is so easy to get distracted and stressed. The service will feature readings from several members and friends of our congregation, as well as from guests of diverse cultural backgrounds.

December 8th: "Humility and Awe," Rev. Diane Dowgiert

The winter holiday season is a time of awe, a time to ponder the wondrous mystery of creation and consider our place within it. Using the words of two prophets—one contemporary and one ancient—we'll look at how humility and awe go hand-in-hand and may very well be what can save us in our current time.

December 15th: "Reclaiming Wonder," Rev. Diane Dowgiert

Direct experience of mystery and wonder is one of the sources of a Unitarian Universalist faith. The long, dark nights of winter invite us to imagine and wonder, to engage a sense of curiosity and ponder mystery. How might we reclaim the religious experience of wonder this holiday season? December 22nd: "Spirit of the Christmas Tree," Rev. Diane Dowgiert, Jessica Zimmer, & the UUS Choir

"Spirit of the Christmas Tree," is an intergenerational worship service and pageant written by Joyce Poley, Frank Henning, and Lorne Kellett, that celebrates the Christmas nativity story from a Unitarian Universalist perspective. The pageant is a re-enactment of the age-old story of the birth of Jesus and will feature the usual characters: angels, wise men, shepherds, and a family of three. The tableau will use words, music, and assorted sizes of real people.

This wonderful story is a work of art and, as with all works of art, is open to interpretation. Therein lies its beauty, its depth, and its mystery—a story representative of spiritual truths and timeless values. A few of the things we can learn from the teachings of Jesus include: that we should love one another; that there is power in forgiveness; and that we should seek justice in the world and help those less fortunate. As the story is re-enacted we can try to reclaim his message in a way that is relevant to our lives and to our religious liberalism.

Christmas arrives every year. Sometimes it isn't the Christmas we expect or hope for. Sometimes, though, we get the Christmas we need. Sometimes it comes as an unexpected gift. Sometimes it comes through our intentional efforts to create the time and space for the spirit to enter in—the openness and the presence needed to hear the angels sing. We'll celebrate the gifts of the season through story and song, ending with the lighting of candles and the singing of Silent Night. The 5:30 pm service is intended to be lively and family-friendly. The 7 pm service is quieter and more contemplative. People of all ages are welcome at both services. From the Interim Minister's Study

Our Unitarian Universalist faith draws on six sources of wisdom to guide us in our search for truth and meaning. The first source is:

Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which

moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces that create and uphold life.

The theme we are exploring during the month of December is *Awe*. We have all experienced awe at one time or another: sitting under a star-spangled sky on a moonless night, waking to the gentle glow of a new day at dawn, witnessing the ferocious power of a tornado, or firestorm, or hurricane, or blizzard, hearing the first cry of a newborn child. Awe is that which takes our breath away and brings us to our knees.

Awe is—well, dare I say it?—a religious experience—“for whom religion exists not as a dull habit, but as an acute fever rather,” as William James said in his classic book, *Varieties of Religious Experience*. Awe is a gateway that opens us to curiosity and wonder about powers and forces greater than we are. It leads to questions about the mysteries of life and death, our place in this world, and our place in the cosmos.

The winter season of holiday celebrations can be a time of mystery, wonder, and awe. We gather with family and friends to tell ancient stories, to keep traditions alive—and if we are wise—to make time and space for a spirit of wonder that will enliven our hearts, enlighten our minds, and renew our commitment to living lives of meaning and purpose.

In this season of mystery and wonder, curiosity and awe, as Unitarian Universalists we celebrate the miracles of light and life in many ways. Whether you observe Chanukah, or the Winter Solstice, or the Yuletide, or Christmas, or Kwanza, or all of them, or none of them, may we all find ways to open ourselves to the awesome grandeur of this beautiful world and this one wild and precious life we are given. Blessings of the season to you and yours.

Ministerial Search Committee (MSC) Report

After countless meetings and discussions, your Ministerial Search Committee has furnished answers to some eighty questions in a Questionnaire that will be a key aspect of the packet that candidates will see in their online packet later this month. Jerry Wetlaufer led the effort to complete the questionnaire, which answers questions in such areas as Desires and Expectations Regarding Minister, Religious Education, Worship Service, Finances, and UUS History. All committee members helped to research and provide answers, and we received important support from Rev. Diane, other staff, and UUS Board members. We believe the Questionnaire, the Congregational Survey, and other data and photographs will prepare candidates for the next steps in this process. Up next: All of this data will be uploaded to a special online portal that candidates can review. Resumes of candidates also will be on that site, and we will be able to review them before selecting our top candidates and, eventually, narrowing that down to three candidates and planning for the pre-candidate weekends.

辭別 (Farewell) Peng Zhang, Staff Accompanist

Soon to be Dr. Peng Zhang has served the UUS as our staff accompanist since September 2016. On Friday, December 20th, he will receive his DMA in piano performance from the University of Iowa where he studied with Dr. Ksenia Nosikova, and he will shortly thereafter be ending his tenure with UUS.

The job description for the UUS Staff Accompanist includes selecting, preparing, and performing music for the preludes, offertory, interludes, and meditations; leading hymns from the Steinway; and rehearsing with and accompanying the UUS Adult Choir. Peng also accompanies guest vocal and instrumental soloists and is available to play for special gatherings, memorial services, and wedding celebrations. The music he has played for us over his 3+ years at UUS was selected from a varied and diverse classical and secular repertoire, complementing and enhancing the themes of at least 153 services. In a single year he accompanies 160 hymns, 30 choral anthems, selects and prepares 89 preludes/meditations/interludes, and is at the Steinway for miscellaneous music needed for church services.

Peng will be honored at a reception after the service on Sunday, December 22nd. Peng's plans are to return to China in January to teach, compete and play professionally.

Covenant Group Council Report

In November, covenant groups took up the subject of “Attention.” It may seem easy to pay attention to something but it's really not. Attention is a complex process with profound implications. According to Mary Oliver, “Attention is the beginning of devotion.” Truly attending to something or someone calls on commitment, identification, and perhaps eventually love. In preparation for their meetings, group members were asked to practice focusing their attention on different aspects of their lives to see if it gave them fresh perspectives or feelings. UUS Wins 1000 Friends Award

UUS has been designated a winner of the 1000 Friends' Best Development Awards in the New Civic category as a model of responsible development practices that provide benefits to the community, the environment, and the quality of life for future generations. 1000 Friends of Iowa is a statewide nonprofit organization founded in 1998 and based in Des Moines, Iowa. This group is focused solely on promoting responsible land use and sustainability in community, state, and federal development decisions.

The program is designed to bring attention to cities, companies, non-profit organizations and individuals who demonstrate how responsible development and planning practices can make a difference. The best projects show collaboration between public and private sectors to build, re-purpose, or preserve our infrastructure. These buildings and projects provide sustainability to our state by considering site placement, design, water efficiency, energy management, the materials and resources used, indoor environmental quality, and public use and benefit.

Mission/Vision Follow-up Forum, December 8th

On November 2nd, we had an unprecedented number of congregational members attend our Mission and Vision Workshop. The 12 Visioneers then took all of our input and came up with our new proposed Mission statement which says:

"We are a welcoming, spiritually diverse home.

We act on our values:

- Honor the Earth.
- Advocate for racial and social justice.
- Nurture deep connections.
- Embrace the ongoing quest for meaning."

Our new proposed Vision statement is:

"We aspire to be a more inclusive, loving, diverse congregation that welcomes all people. We will defend and celebrate the Earth, confront racial and social injustice, and nurture deep connections. "

On Sunday, December 8th, after the service, Kirk Witzberger and Amy Fretz will be holding a follow-up Mission and Vision Forum in the Sanctuary for anyone who would like to talk about our new proposed Mission and Vision statements.

Labyrinth Opening Ceremony, December 8th

The official opening of the UUS Labyrinth will be on Sunday, December 8th, at 11:30 am. Weather permitting, we'll mark the occasion with some opening words followed by an inaugural walk of the labyrinth, complete with meditative music played on chimes.

The labyrinth is a tool to facilitate reflection, meditation, and/or prayer. It is an ancient symbol used by a wide variety of cultures for perhaps 5000 years. The labyrinth has a single continuous path with no possibility of going astray. It is different from a maze which has walls and puzzling wrong turns. The labyrinth is an inclusive space, welcoming those of all faith and secular traditions.

There is no right or wrong way to walk the labyrinth. Some may wish to use the classic three-part approach of releasing concerns or details of daily life on the way in, resting in the peaceful atmosphere of the center, and then returning by the same path, which will lead you out renewed and empowered. Others may wish to engage in mindfulness meditation, paying attention to putting one foot in front of the other. Still others may just wish to let their mind wander or become more quiet. This is a time to relax, reflect, enjoy, and be open to whatever comes.

The labyrinth is a sacred space, and it is important to respect others who may be on the path with you. If you meet someone face-to-face, simply step to one side and let them pass. Similarly, as walking the labyrinth is done at your own pace, some may wish to walk more rapidly than others.

Our UUS Labyrinth has nine circuits, which is a modified version of the classical 11-circuit design found in many medieval churches. It is a .35-mile walk with ~800 steps. The design incorporates materials and spaces to accommodate wheelchair access and people with limited mobility. It is constructed of maintenance-free materials we believe will survive whatever our Iowa weather throws at it. Our labyrinth is meant to be enjoyed by any and all who wish to experience what it has to offer. See a picture on page 7.

UUS Steinway-in-Residence Holiday Concert, December 15th

Mark your calendars for a joyous event at UUS on Sunday, December 15th, at 6 pm. This early evening concert will feature the UUS Piano Ensemble and guest artists. The program will include solos, duets, and 8-hand arrangements of seasonal and classical works. Two Steinway pianos will be featured, the West Music in-residence Steinway Spirio, also known as the Model B seven-foot 'Classic' grand, and the UUS Steinway, Model L. The Steinway Spirio is the result of new technology which allows a high-resolution player system that perfectly reproduces performances from artists that are indistinguishable from live performance—a player piano.

The first half of the concert will feature the UUS Piano Ensemble: Jane DeWitt, Lynette Marshall, Nik Jakob, and Peng Zhang. They will be playing four movements of the Peer Gynt Suite Op. 46 and seasonal music including many familiar melodies: Silent Night!, Angels We Have Heard on High, Once in Royal David's City, O Come, All Ye Faithful, and Wassail, Wassail (ala Manheim Steamroller).

The second half of the concert will feature Hsin-Hui playing Liszt's Grand Sonata in B minor S178. For the program closer Peng Zhang will be joined by three of his colleagues, Heqng Huang, Hsin-Hui, and Ming Hu, all at the same keyboard playing the rousing "Le Grand Galop" for eight hands by Albert Lavignac.

A reception will follow the concert in the Atrium. There is no charge for the concert, and there will be an opportunity to experience a virtual reality tour of the Steinway Spirio in the church lobby.

Very Merry Vegan Plantluck, December 25th

The UU Vegetarian Community (UUVVC) will host a Very Merry Vegan Plantluck on Christmas Day, Wednesday, December 25th, at 1 pm in Fellowship Hall. Everyone is welcome.

Holiday Outreach

Our congregation supports four immigrant families in a program called Circle of Friends. You are invited to "play Santa" for these families. On both December 1st and 8th, you may take a gift request for the children or parents of our families. Fifth Sunday Offering, December 15th

In months with five Sundays, the Social Justice Team selects a special organization or effort to receive the extra week's Sunday offering. On Sunday, December 15th, the Fifth Sunday offering will benefit the [Eastern Iowa Community Bond Project](#). There are 40,000 undocumented immigrants in Iowa, and they are at great risk of deportation. Nearly 40% of them live with children under 18 who have U.S. citizenship. Bond is one of the most important factors that determines if an immigrant arrested by ICE will be deported. The average bond cost is \$5,000-7,000. The program pays for bond as it is able, and the money is returned if the immigrant is not deported; it can then be used for another individual.

UU Free Lunch Report

Diners at our November 8th Free Lunch Program enjoyed a special entree thanks to the Roots and Wings Covenant Group who prepared delicious meat loaves as their Day of Service project. One guest came back for seconds and told us enthusiastically, "I love meat loaf and this one is really, really great!" UUS volunteers served 127 meals and—as always—shared conversations in the kitchen and with our guests. A record 40 UUS volunteers helped by donating ingredients for our menu (vegetarian lasagna by Caryl Lyons, green and fruit salads, cooked vegetables, desserts/ice cream, and beverages) as well as preparing and serving food, doing dishes, and cleaning up. A special thanks to Gay Mikelson for doing all the laundry each month. Thanks also to the three University of Iowa students who volunteered with us as part of their Undergraduate Leadership Program. MEETING HIGHLIGHTS – November 13, 2019

Board meeting minutes are available on the website or can be requested from the UUS administrator.

- Present:** Amy Fretz (President), Joe Rasmussen (Vice-President), Jane DeWitt (Past-President), Chris Rode (Treasurer), Allison Bettine (Secretary), John Raley (Finance Trustee), Michael Honey-Arcement (Trustee), Paul Pomrehn (Trustee), Colleen Higgins (Trustee), and Rev. Board President Fretz called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. Higgins provided opening words.

Consent Agenda & Announcements: Consent agenda and other items are uploaded to Dropbox for Board review prior to the meeting.

Consent Agenda items: July Board Meeting Minutes, August Board Meeting Minutes, September Board Meeting Minutes, October Board Meeting Minutes, November Executive Meeting Minutes, and Interim Minister's Report.

The Board received the Consent Agenda and approved the November Board Agenda, July Board Meeting Minutes, August Board Meeting Minutes, September Board Meeting Minutes, October Board Meeting Minutes (pending noted changes), November Executive Meeting Minutes, and Interim Minister's Report.

Proposed Bylaws Changes: A second reading of the proposed changes to the Bylaws occurred and subsequent discussion surrounded the membership process policy. Honey-Arcement requested the Board reconsider the 30-day rule in the membership section that grants voting rights to new members only after 30 days rather than upon their completion of the membership process. Rasmussen raised the issue of transferable membership while Raley brought to the Board options for dual-membership and questions about returning members. A final reading of the proposed Bylaw changes will take place at the December Board Meeting and a vote will occur.

Library Policy Proposal: The Library Policy Proposal received a second reading, and Fretz called for a motion to approve. A motion was made and seconded. Motion did not carry. The Board voted to table the discussion and the vote until the December Board Meeting.

Ministerial Search Committee Update: Wetlaufer shared the UUA's new recommendations for ministerial contracts. It is the expectation of the UUA that any departures from the recommended contract be brought to the attention of ministerial candidates with complete transparency. Further, Wetlaufer requested the approval of the Board that the Ministerial Search Committee communicate congregational efforts concerning growth pattern demographics research as well as the move toward routine evaluations.
