Dear Ones,

What has delighted you recently?

As my mind strayed over this question, I remembered my friend's videos of the kitten her family recently adopted. The puppy my sister's family recently brought home, with her giant paws, eyes that beckon, and sweet sleepiness. The irises outside my windows. Our recent bridging and school transitions ceremony at UUS.

And I noticed something: So many of the moments of delight that spring to my mind and heart are about new or ephemeral things.

There is a piece of this that is inevitable—delight is something we experience in a moment and our minds like novelty. And yet, what is it about the constants of life that make it harder for us to sink into delighting in them? What is it about how our brains and bodies have evolved, and how our minds have been trained, that coaxes us into not noticing the magic, the mystery, the joy, the delight of what we experience every day? That makes it so that we need to make an effort—even an effort as subtle as settling into a spiritual practice or as gentle yet complex as realigning our minds—to notice the everyday wonder that is all around us?

Even as I write this, noticing how cognitive and evolutionary psychology and neuroscience play into this phenomenon, I also notice the wonder of this. That while yes, we can't

spend our entire lives in delight (it wouldn't be wise to foreclose the whole range of human emotion) and there are good reasons that we adjust to our environments so that we're not always washed away in a swirl of amazement, we still have the capacity to readjust and tune in.

In this time when we're coming back together again in old and new ways, when we're noticing that our skills for caring for each other, expressing gratitude, engaging with conflict, and meeting new people are a bit rusty, we can reattune our minds and spirits to the delight of learning and practicing ways of being together. And, while not using delight and wonder to escape the hard stuff, we can help ourselves and each other drop back into noticing the wonder of the old and the new. (My dog is trying to help me by showing what a great belly he has and how delightful it is when I scratch it, especially while he is rolling in fresh grass.)

As the calendar turns to June and our theme turns to Delight, may each of us embrace this opportunity to explore how delight moves in and shapes our lives.

These changes are not written in stone, and we should continue to evaluate whether they are working for us, as we evaluate all of our policies and bylaws. The work of creating bylaws and policies is never done, especially in our current world that changes and shifts ever more rapidly. The Board, along with the Minister, the Governance Committee, and the Mission and Vision Review Committee will continue to assess what policies and bylaws are working for us and what needs to be reviewed.

As I reflect back on this year as your President, I think about when I started coming to this congregation, back in High School. My life was pretty tumultuous at that time. Some of you may remember me from back then. My life was not what it

is now, yet there are members of this congregation who stood by me and believed in me. Things were not always smooth, or without pain, and I have left this community and returned to it. Spring 2023 Election Vote Results

The results are in from the election that followed our Congregational Meeting on May 21st, 2023. Voting took place on ElectionBuddy and closed on May 26th, 2023, at 5 pm.

From Your Director of Congregational and Community Engagement, Peggy Garrigues

With Gratitude and a Fond Farewell!

My position here at the UU Society began in September of 2016, so I will have been on staff here for almost 7 years when I leave on June 11. I was drawn to apply to be the Director of Congregational Life here in Iowa when I lived in Michigan in part because of the similarities I saw with the First UU Congregation in Ann Arbor, Michigan, where I had been Acting Assistant Minister for three years: both congregations are in a major university town, with significant land around the building, with a vibrant congregation, and with a strong environmental and social justice identity. I was especially drawn to the audacity of the goal of UUS to become "the greenest church in Iowa."

I was also being nudged to leave United Methodist ministry, because after I came to a late in life realization of being lesbian, I could not fully be myself as a United Methodist minister without risking my livelihood. So I trusted in and am deeply grateful for the welcome that all of you have offered to me to use my ministry skills and experience here at UUS, and as a lesbian woman, looking to develop my relationship with Sarah without having to risk my job or to hide in the closet.

I have thoroughly enjoyed my time here at UUS and getting to know and collaborating with all of you in so many ways! There are so many committed, caring, and passionate people here at UUS, wanting to live lives with deep meaning, and making a difference in the community and the world!

There have been many transitions we have been through together-I began while the new building was being built, and when we had Sunday services at 1:30 in the afternoon at the Sanctuary Church, then for a little while at the Kirkwood Regional Center, then through the large open house and getting used to the new building once it was finished. I remember all the planning for how to use the land here at UUS once we moved into the new building, the creative work of publicity staff and team members as UUS planned new programs, and the several months of attempts to come up with a new name for the congregation as we moved to Coralville-which ended up just being to unofficially drop the "of Iowa City." I have had three great ministers to work under-Rev. Steven Protzman, Interim Minister Rev. Diane Dowgiert, and now I am honored to have worked for almost three years under Rev. Diana Smith, your only minister hired after a candidating week on Zoom!

Transitioning into the COVID pandemic required learning many new tech skills for all of us, and re-evaluating what we could offer fully online, how to still gather in some form on Sundays, and how to connect with members and friends. Transitioning out of the COVID pandemic, I offered to take on the coordination of building rentals, since it would have been a challenge to hire a new staff person at that time. Emma will now return to overseeing the rental area, with the amazing volunteer help of Sue Kann. Rev. Diana continues to offer wise leadership to guide you in new directions, along with the current wonderful, committed, and creative program and administrative staff: Emma, Nic, Alex, Hsin-Hui, Nik Jakob (who is also leaving his staff role), and others who will be hired soon. And along with staff, every Board team has had major work to do to guide UUS through those transitions, and every group has had to adapt its work and ways of gathering.

Since September 2016, after being welcomed by Hospitality Teams, and with the help of committed Membership Associates to guide them through new member classes, and the support of many congregational and group leaders (and even during COVID!), 122 people have become members of UUS. They each have brought new gifts, ideas, and energy to UUS.

So many congregation wide programs have happened over my time here guided by various staff and volunteers: visiting and learning about congregations and traditions of other faiths, COVID Care Calling, you had all just started using the Realm database as I arrived, Anti-Racism Study Groups, wrapping up the Capital Campaign, rentals of our new building, a new picture directory, the Open House and Dedication of our new building, 5 years of Wellspring groups, our 175th Anniversary, Listening Teams, Community Meals and several variations of Wednesday evening programming, Dinners for Eight, new vision and mission statement development, music concerts, Family Fun Nights, Engaging Our Theological Diversity, virtual social hours, Treats and Talents Auctions, Covenant Groups, White Supremacy workshops, our first Earth Festival, drive-through events, Pride Parades, delivering program packets during COVID, and summer camps will begin the day after I leave.

I am deeply grateful for the many wonderful experiences of witnessing "aha!" moments from people in new member classes, in Wellspring groups, in other classes I taught, at Sunday services, with the new covenant group I helped get off the ground, and with visitors to their first Sunday service here. I have been inspired in my collaborations with so many wonderful volunteers and group leaders that offer places to find a home in this community while nurturing the journey of mind and spirit, bringing people into deeper relationship, and making a difference.

But I have also missed being in the role of minister—preaching, planning worship, doing pastoral care, offering more expansive interpretations of long held traditions, using both new and familiar texts, and being more in the lead to guide a congregation in a new direction. I was not clear whether I would ever go back into United Methodist ministry. The official rules still do not allow "practicing" gay and lesbian ministers to serve churches. But Bishop Kennetha Bigham-Tsai and other conference leadership in the Iowa Conference of The United Methodist Church are willing to go beyond the current rules, to allow me to help break ground as one of a very small number of openly gay United Methodist ministers in Iowa. So I am off on a new adventure to be the minister of Solon United Methodist Church.

I am grateful that I am not moving anywhere and can still be nurtured by the friendships I have developed here at UUS—although my involvement at UUS will be limited for a while, as is typical when a full-time staff person moves on, so that their successors can get a good start. I am sure that my wife, Sarah Ross, and my mother-in-law, Gail Ross, will visit Solon UMC from time to time, but they will continue their involvement here at UUS as members and part of this community.

I wish you all the best as I say farewell. You have an inspirational minister, great staff and volunteer leadership in place, diverse and committed members and friends, many enriching community partnerships, engaging challenges to face together, and wonderful opportunities to make a difference in the future!

Earth Festival a Success!

On May 6th, 2023, UUS hosted our first annual Earth Festival. The festival included workshops, speakers, food, a basket raffle with over 15 themed baskets, and an area for local non-profits or businesses to have a table with information related to learning about nature, the earth, climate change, and also the diversity of human life on earth and in the Iowa City area. We also had a sensory room and a room with earth-related movies playing for anyone needing a quiet break from the crowds.

An estimated 200 people attended the Earth Festival. We received over \$500 in donations at the door and another \$500+ for the raffle baskets. The Youth Group earned over \$400 from their face-painting booth, and UUS received around \$350 in vendor fees. Thank you to everyone who donated, volunteered, or attended!



Safe Learning Space for Trans Kids in Iowa Crowfunding Campaign Update

We are so pleased to announce that our Faithify crowdfunding campaign to fund our Learning Space this fall was a success! The campaign ran from April 15th to May 16th with a goal of \$15,000. We ended up raising over \$17,000 with nearly 100 backers from UUS, the local community, and from supportive UU congregations and friends from around the nation. - Expanding Our Whole Lives (OWL) comprehensive sexuality education programming for Learning Space participants in grades 4-6 and 7-9.
- Add-on programming options for Learning Space attendees and other trans children and youth in our community that include music, movement, art, therapeutic outdoor sessions, and more!

Building Our Leadership Muscles

Featured leadership practice:Modeling the Way



Tom and Mary McMurray are longtime UUS members (pillars) who raised two children in our society. Their background includes hospital HR work and legal work. At UUS they see things that need doing and then do them, whether it is picking up trash, pulling weeds, protecting our new trees from the deer, helping with Sunday School, pastoral care, or hospitality work. Two of their current passions are helping an Afghan refugee family and working on our land ministry.

Our new UUS property has a garlic mustard problem. We also have a fantastic display of spring wildflowers. As part of our UUS value of "Honoring the Earth," and their land ministry commitment, Tom and Mary have taken the lead in combatting this invasive species to keep it from crowding out our native species. In this task, they model the way–spending hours each Spring pulling garlic mustard on their own or setting up pulling times so others can be involved.

The McMurrays select several Saturdays each Spring when they ask for volunteers to help. Typically, anywhere from five to fifteen people gather to receive a brief training and then get to work pulling garlic mustard. Tom typically loads the back of his Subaru with a dozen bags of the pulled weeds. These he transports to the Coralville garlic mustard collection point for proper disposal.

Without this annual battle, garlic mustard would crowd out the beautiful wildflowers that show up each Spring on our UUS acreage.

Will the McMurrays' "modeling the way" leadership style enable our Spring wildflowers to flourish?

UUS Team and Committee Reports

Covenant Groups

In our May covenant groups, members compared their notions of "creativity." Creativity is one of those ideas that seems at once both easy and hard to explain. One could simply define it as making new things, putting something into the world that didn't exist before. But that's a bit materialistic. Creativity isn't just about things, it's about attitude, about the creator's approach to whatever it is they're doing. If it's you, are you merely following the routine, tried-and-true patterns, or are you putting something uniquely yours into it, changing the act into a form of "self-expression"?

There's a social dimension to it, too. No creative person creates in isolation but within a community, absorbing and reacting to the ideas they're surrounded by, the creativity of others. As the Soul Matters introduction puts it, "the...idea that artists, innovators and originals are isolate, independent geniuses" is a myth. Closer to the truth is that "the secret to creative self-expression is staying connected to each other." Does that thought make sense to you, or do you have other ideas about the nature of creativity? Whatever the answer, it's obvious that you have to get pretty creative to talk about it!

Free Lunch Program Team

The Iowa City Free Lunch Program no longer provides clamshell containers for take out. Instead, we have reverted (finally) to all dining in. However, UUS Free Lunch Team members have been up-cycling containers from our homes so that toward the end of our sessions, guests can take out meals to go. This saves money and eases functionality.

The meeting was called to order at 7:02 pm. Walberg lit the chalice and provided opening words.

Consent Agenda: The Board received the consent agenda. The Board voted unanimously to approve the consent agenda, with the exception of the April Meeting Minutes (March minutes were included in the packet instead of the April minutes).

NEW BUSINESS:

Endowment Event: Endowment is planning an event that has not occurred since prior to Covid (Educational Event). Originally planned for Summer but will be pushed to Fall.

Stewardship Committee Plans: The Stewardship committee would like to create a "match pool". Individuals could put any amount of donation into the pool. The pool will be used to match annual pledges. April Financial Report Highlights

Our total bank accounts balance was steady over these four months with strong pledge giving and mostly normal monthly expenses. Our bank accounts' sum being essentially constant month-to-month shows the value of having the extra \$4,000 per month from General Endowment funds. That means that the \$65,000 in extra bank funds we have committed to covering the 2023 deficit remains unused so far. Big bills are coming that will require these funds, but having all \$65,000 still in reserve means that our financial plan is working well.
